To begin your History Hunt...Enter the Cemetery through the front gate (off Rt 11). As you enter can you find the answer to clue #1?

1. My name is upon the plaque. I died in about 1981. I am remembered for my Barbershop on South Main Street, which was called Brown's Barber Shop. I operated it for 40 years. I was a veteran of WWII and in life I lived on Pleasant Ave.

Stay to the left (S. Main Street) to section 12 for your hike to continue....and find....

2. I ran a hotel in Central Square in 1888 where the Fire Department is today. I also was a veteran of the Civil War. In the war I was wounded when a bullet shattered my right arm. In 1864 I married my wife, Lucinda. In about 1870 I drove a stage coach from Syracuse to Central Square and back.

3. I enlisted September 1864 in the 21st Artillery. In the fall of 1881 (September) I was pumping water from a cistern and image my surprised when I pumped out two good sized snakes. Alarmed I decided to have my cistern cleaned at 11 more snakes were found! I was born January 19, 1829 and my wifes name is Louisa Pooler.

4. I was a Mason, their symbol is on my stone. I was born in 1847, lived in Central Square and died in 1920 in Lockport. My wife, Harriet is buried beside me. Don't be fooled...our stones are nothing alike.

5. When the Village of Central Square was incorporated in 1890 I was the First Village President, Today you would call me a Mayor. With my brother, James, we ran a hardware business in Central Square. I built the home that later became know as the home of Paul V. Moore Sr and today houses Cronks Insurance Agency at 647 South Main Street. My wife, Margaret Campbell and our infant son share my stone. I died August 8, 1893.

6. I was born May 13, 1851. At the age of 21 I went to work on the railroad and later was a clerk in a hotel in Syracuse. Next I worked in a hardware store and in 1884 I was a farmer and owned 125 acres in Central Square. I served two terms as the Supervisor for the Town of Hastings. My wife is Rosella. My last name is the same as the fluffy white stuff that will be flying around here very soon!

7. This family stone is well defined. The names, symbols and inscriptions are clear even from a distance. Look for the anchor and the inscription that reads, "Which hope we have as an anchor to the soul both sure and steadfast" Below it you will find my name. I am the wife of John and died when I was 75 years and 7 days old

8. My wife and I have a large headstone with our own individual ones by its side. You will have to look close to read them for they are covered with moss, especially my wife, Sarah's. I was in great health when I passed away. It was totally unexpected. I was in the grocery business and a prominent worker with the YMCA. I was born in 1826 and died in 1908. My first name can be used for a male or female. If you glance at my last name you may think "Doom"...but that is one letter off.

9. I was born at the blockhouse in Brewerton in 1820. My large farmhouse still sits just outside of Central Square where I farmed for many years. I died October 8 at the age of 71 years old. My wife, Phoebe's name is below mine on our stone.
